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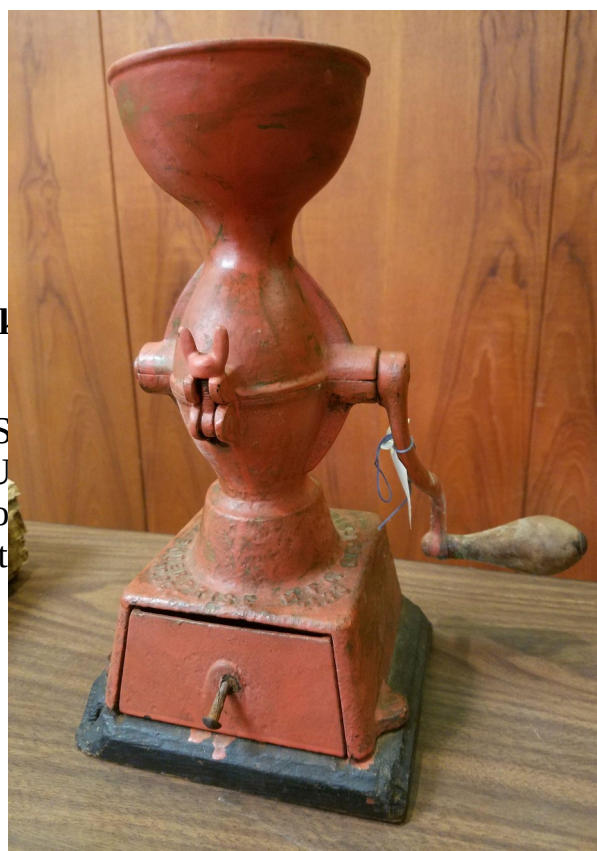

If you're like most people, it's difficult to find the time to do these things. I don't know where to start. Many boxes of unorganized material are brought to the Museum. I can't count the number of times I've had someone come to me and say "My mother left this, and I have no idea what to do with it."

Some boxes which have come to us include very personal letters, videos, biographies, and/or other legal paperwork (with social security numbers). This is one good reason not to accidentally donate or throw out something that can be used to study a deceased family member). Another good reason is that your heirs will more likely preserve something (by bringing it to a Museum) or pass it down within the family if they know its significance.

As you might imagine, organizing many collections here at the Museum is a lot of work. For this reason, we rely on a standard numbering process (called accessioning). If you have a lot to go through, doing things like a Museum may make finding what you need to do this are some folders and pencils (believe it or not, graphite is safe to write directly on your photos).

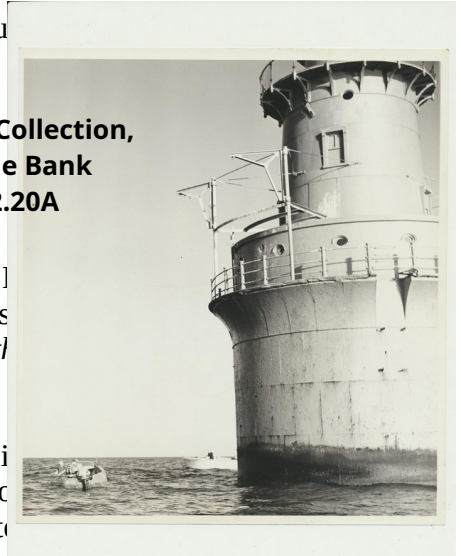


(Above) Ed Holder Collection, Fishing—

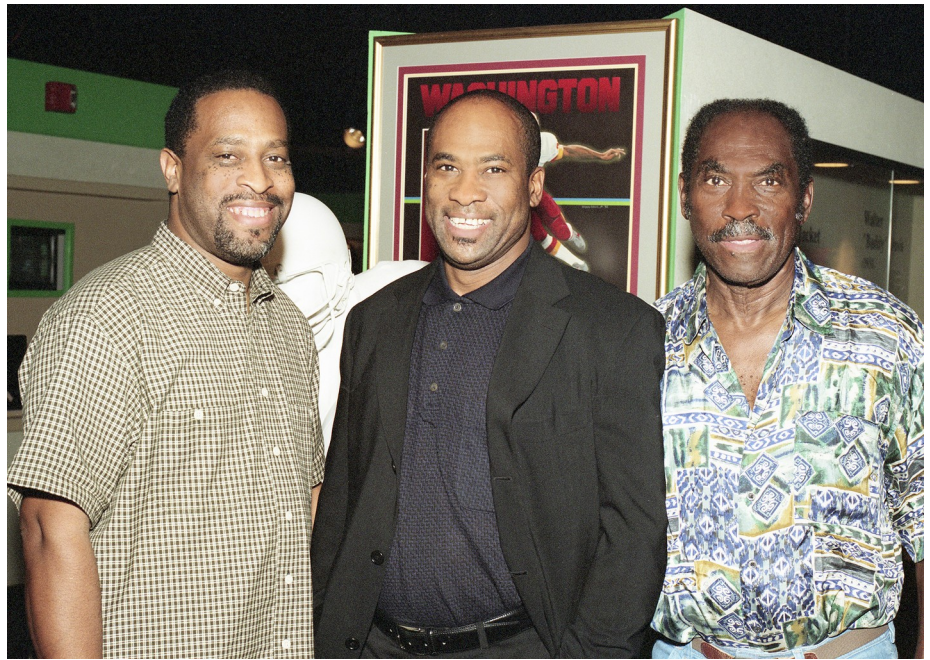

The Ed Holder Collection was sorted for an upcoming exhibition. It consists of objects (cameras), articles, photos, and negatives related to local outdoor writer and conservationist Ed Holder.

To take thousands of items and make sense of them in just a few days, this is what we do:

Museum Processing 101

Set up a space where you can lay out everything you have (table or floor). Get **four** bins.

Separate kinds of materials. Your first bin is for newspaper. Newspaper is highly acidic and will damage photos and other documents, so it should always be stored separately or in a sleeve. Your second bin is for other kinds of paper items, and your third bin is for photos. Bin 4 is anything that doesn't fit into 1-3.

Divide your table into four sections with masking tape. You can further divide these sections later. Let's say we are working on our Photograph bin. We start with sorting Duck Hunting, Saltwater Fishing, Freshwater Fishing, and "Other" - anything that doesn't fit into 1-3. Once we are done, we then take "Saltwater Fishing" and further divide it into Redfish, Flounder, etc.

When items are sufficiently divided, assign each group of items a number alphabetically by name. This will be the folder it goes into. File folders alphabetically and numerically in a box and then put items into the individual folders. So, for example — Redfish is #48.

You can use a legal pad or enter items into your computer (I use Excel) to provide a reference list of what is in the box, and then tape the list to the inside of the lid. As you have time, you can individually pull folders, add information or scan them without the burden of trying to do the whole collection at once. You can mark on a folder "scanned" and know exactly where to start when you have free time again. This breaks up a huge task into something manageable and makes finding what you want very fast!



**Janis Joplin may be an inspiration to many,
but who were her musical heroes?**



Bessie Smith, a blues musician who died in 1937 (Janis was born in 1943) was so beloved by Janis that she contributed money to have a marker put on her grave in 1970. *A Cast of Blues* features 15 resin-cast masks of blues legends created by artist Sharon McConnell-Dickerson. "A life cast is like a 3D photograph to someone who is blind," says McConnell-Dickerson, who is visually impaired herself. "It captures the flesh, muscle, bone, hair, and subtle expressions of emotion. I wanted to discover the faces behind the music I love." In addition, the exhibition includes 15 color photographs of blues artists and the colorful juke joints in which they played. The images are selected from acclaimed photographer Ken Murphy.

The exhibition features braille labels and educational materials, as well as music and a closed-captioned film. In addition, visitors are encouraged to touch the resin-cast masks.

is an actual Oscar winner? And, yes, that person's golden statue is on display at the Museum of the Gulf Coast!

Leah Rhodes started out as a window dresser in her home town of Port Arthur and in San Antonio. In 1926, she and her husband moved to California. She soon began working in the Warner Brothers wardrobe department. Rhodes eventually took over the department when her boss, famed costume designer Orry-Kelly, was drafted into the war. Rhodes made history in 1949 when she won the first ever Oscar for Best Color Costume Design for *Adventures of Don Juan*, starring Errol Flynn.

During her career with Warner Brothers, she dressed some of Hollywood's biggest names, including Bette Davis, Ingrid Bergman, Hedy Lamarr, Doris Day and Jane Wyman. Rhodes would later do freelance work for Universal Studios and Paramount... where she worked closely Edith Head - one of the most famous costume designers in Hollywood history.

She remained passionate about her work and continued to create costumes until she was in her 80s.

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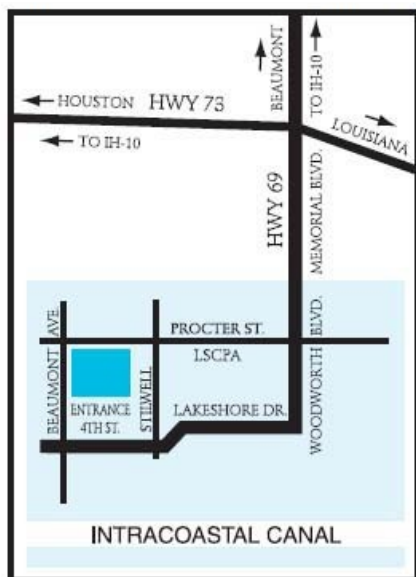
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
